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As the kindergarten classes continue their study of communities, we have begun to discuss FAMILIES and the role(s) they play in communities. In class we have discussed different types of families and how, despite the make-up of each family, the central "ingredient" in each one is LOVE.

Along with human families, the students have been learning about animal families. In class the children have discovered that family members often resemble one another. They have used that knowledge to help them match animal babies with their parents. The students have also learned about two groups of animals (MAMMALS and BIRDS) and have discussed the characteristics (traits) of each.




## BUILDING NUMBERS and MORE/LESS

In week two we will be reading The Picnic at Apple Park. Families in a neighborhood pack up food and games for a picnic at the park. I am learning that stories can happen in different places and at different times. This is the setting. This story starts inside each family's home. Then everyone is at the park.

Play "Same or Different" with your child, using pairs of objects that are the same and different sizes, such as your shoes/child's shoes, your hand/child's hand, and so on. Ask your child: Are these hands the same or different? How are they the same and how are they different?

In week three we will be reading Peter's Chair. Peter has a new baby sister. His parents have painted his old cradle for the baby, and they want to paint his old blue chair. He doesn't want them to paint his old blue chair! I am learning how to use the pictures and details in a book along with what I know from my life to guess what will happen next. We will be reading about what Peter does with his old chair.

#### MY WORDS TO KNOW

High-Frequency Word: we, the I'm going to write each word on a sticky note and put them on the table. Then I'll say the words and you can point to each one. Then we can say the word. We can look for these words in some of your books. Stick each note on the page where you find the word.

Concept Words: size words big. small. short. tall Let's play "Who Is It?" I'll ask questions about our relatives. For example: Who is big? Who is short? You can answer the auestions

#### DID YOU KNOW ....

- streets that are well lit and have neighbors that you know.
- Take a parent, or an older sister or brother with you when you go trick-ortreating. If someone older cannot go with you, then go with a group.
- Trick-or-treat when it is still light outside, if possible.
- Wear a costume that makes it easy for you walk and can be seen after dark.
- Carry a flashlight and use reflective tape on your costume so that people driving cars can see you.
- If you wear a mask, take it off before crossing streets. If possible, wear make-up instead of a mask.
- Cross only at corners. Never cross the street between parked cars or in the middle of a busy block.
- If there are no sidewalks, walk facing oncoming traffic to make sure you can see the cars.
- Do not eat your candy until you get home and an adult can check it over to make sure it's safe.

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
