Developing a Love of Learning

Developmental Assets are 40 key building blocks to help children succeed. This month we will focus on the "COMMITMENT TO LEARNING" assets. These include: 1. Achievement expectation and motivation - parents and other adults convey and reinforce expectations to do well. 2. Children are engaged in learning - parents and family members model responsive and attentive attitudes in all situations. 3. Stimulating activity and homework - parents encourage children to explore and provide stimulating activities that match children's emerging skills. 4. Enjoyment of learning and bonding to school - parents and other adults enjoy learning and engage preschoolers in learning activities. 5. Reading for pleasure - adults read to preschoolers for at least 30 minutes a day, encouraging them to participate. The more your child is committed to learning, the more likely he or she will grow up healthy. Our job as parents is to encourage our children to value learning and make a personal commitment to it. How do we do that, especially when many older kids say school is boring or no fun? Here are some ideas for building your child's commitment to Learning Assets:

- Encourage and support your child to find things that get them excited about learning, and provide opportunities to help them develop those interests further.
- Be a role model. Show your child your enthusiasm about learning new skills and information.
- Create a book-a-month club. Have everyone in the family read a book and discuss it. This shows the child how everyone, no matter what age, gets committed to learning together as a family.
